PAUL'S DEAL OF THE MONTH. I have learned from personal experience that among the most difficult auctions to judge accurately are those arising out of fourth position reopening bids. The very first hand my partner and I encountered in the opening matchpoint event in a New Orleans sectional illustrates why such auctions can give players evaluation problems. My LHO opened 1C in first seat, all vul, which was passed around to me in fourth seat. I
 typically played 12-14 hcp in the reopening seat. The most flexible call is "double," but this hand, while stronger than average, was not big enough to rebid 2 H over the probable 1 S bid expected from partner or to rebid 1 NT , for which it contained the appropriate point count of 15-17 but lacked a club stopper. Note that this good hand actually contains 7 ( $61 / 2$ ?) probable losers, one spade, three diamonds and three clubs. Because of that obvious flaw, I settled on a simple 1 H , with the intention of hoping to bid again to show extra strength. The opponents remained silent as partner somewhat surprisingly bypassed 1 S and raised to 2 H . Recalling that when opener bids 1 H , responder in most partnerships can raise to 2 H on roughly $6-9 \mathrm{hcp}$ with a touch of favorable distribution and three or more trumps but that a raise to 2 H over a reopening 1 H , which can be as weak as 10 or even less hcp and a four card suit, is best played to show a "good" 8 to a "bad" 11 hcp, it was apparent that my hand was worth a game try but what game try? Raising to 3 H seemed pointless, as advancer could not hold strong trumps. After all, I held all three top trumps. Bidding 2NT would show the appropriate strength but my club holding was much too weak for that call. Reasoning that opener apparently held strong clubs for his bid, I decided to make a so called "long suit" or "help suit" game try of 3D. Eureka! Partner jumped to 4 H and all passed. The opening lead was the K . Down came the dummy with
 nevertheless wasted the $\mathbf{v}$ on the third lead, RHO overtrumping for the third defensive trick. There were no more high card tricks for the defense and the trumps broke favorably, so we made ten tricks and 4 H , consisting of one spade, five hearts and four diamonds, for a lucky dummy and trump division but a well earned split top on the board. Only three pairs reached 4 H , so they each collected all but $11 / 2$ matchpoints on that "difficult to reach game" hand. Matchpoints is not a game which favors aggressive "close" game bidding but going slightly against the odds assuredly paid off in this case.

## Easy Double Dummy Problem

Last 4 tricks of a NT contract. North on lead, needs 3 tricks. Assume best play all around, and that everyone knows where all 16 remaining cards are.

## When the bidding system fits the hand like a glove By Arnaldo Partesotti

At the recent Natalie and Julius Rosenblum Sectional you pick up this pretty hand: \& K98 $\mathrm{QKJ5}$ \$KJ96543 -And you hear partner open 1 NT with $\uparrow \mathrm{AJ5}$ YQT84 $\uparrow$ A62 KQ4.
You have visions of slam, but how do you get there? First you transfer to diamonds by bidding 2NT, on which partner bids $3 \uparrow$. You play "if you like it you bid it" so partner likes diamonds, if he did not like them (he had no support) he would have bid 3\&. Looking at your hand, partner must have $\forall A Q(x)$ or $\forall A x(x)$ or $\uparrow$ Qxx or, possible but not likely, *xxxx. Following a transfer to diamonds your choices are simple: you pass (or correct 3 to $3 \uparrow$ ) with a weak hand, bid 3NT with a hand good for game but not good enough for slam, or cue-bid with visions of slam. You play Italian control bids (cue-bids), bidding indifferently first or second round controls, with the exception that the first control bid by either partner is a first round control. You bid 4e, which gives partner plenty of information: you have a diamond suit good enough for slam, you have a first round control in clubs, and you do not have a first round control in hearts or spades, or you would have bid them ahead of clubs. Partner now has doubts only about the heart suit, so he bids 4 which is not a sign off (your cue-bid invited slam and forced to game) but confirms a control in diamonds (the A, seeing your cards) and gives you space for another bid, which you oblige by bidding $4 \checkmark$ (again, this can only be a second round control or you would have bid $3 \uparrow$ over $3 \uparrow$ ). Partner now knows that you are missing the $\vee$ A, he holds the $A$ and bids $6 \uparrow$, presumably you have the $\$$ and/or the or the slam will depend at the most a finesse for the $₫$ or a ruffing finesse for the $A$. The slam is actually lay-down. Well done and... good system!

Post mortem: only five of twenty-seven pairs bid this slam, which is lay-down. Most of the other pairs bid 3 NT, which is always a good bid at matchpoints but... should not this give you some thoughts about your system and bidding agreements? For the record, because of bad judgment, I ended up in 5 laking six for a near zero. You have company...

## Solution to Double Dummy Problem.

North should play the $\uparrow A$ and then the $\uparrow 2$. This will throw East in, who must then lead a heart giving South the last two tricks. When North plays the $₫ \mathrm{~A}$, East should unblock the $₫ \mathrm{~K}$ to try to avoid the throw in. If North then carelessly plays the $\leftrightarrow$ Q, that will be the last trick for North-South, as West will gain the lead at trick 3 and also win trick 4. But if North properly plays the $\$ 2$ at trick 2, East will be thrown in and give up the last two tricks.
